56	repens	Species. A recent arrival in this country, bearing waxy yellow urns on an unusual toothed leaf evergreen plant. Rare and very desirable.
57	repens x songarica	Hybrids. Interesting hybrids from a plant which has songarica type flowers on repens type foliage and habit. White stars on a trailing plant, and as a bonus, likely to be scented!
58*	reticulata	Species. Lavender to purple inverted urns, often with a touch of cream or green, on climbers to about 8-9 ft, with variably net-veined leaflets especially on the underside. Summer to early Autumn flowerer.
59	serratifolia	Species. Small lemon/green bells with a lemon scent, growing to 15 ft. Serrated edge leaves, and good seed heads add to it's impact.
60	songarica	Species. With small, white star shaped scented blooms on an unusual form of plant, which is upright and almost architectural.
61	stans	Species. With lots of small, slim, blue to white, recurved, tubular flowers on an upright plant, growing to about $4-5$ ft. Very delicate, usually scented and most attractive.
62	stans – pink form	Species. With lots of small, slim, hopefully pink, recurved, tubular flowers on an upright plant, growing to about 4 – 5 ft. Very delicate, usually scented and most attractive. Collected from pink flowered forms.
63*	stans – wild collected in Japan	Species. With lots of small, slim, blue to white, recurved, tubular flowers on an upright plant, growing to about $4-5$ ft. Very delicate, usually scented and most attractive.
64*	'Swedish Bells'	Hybrids. Desirable plants, with largish, mid to light blue pendulous bells on a plant to around $6 - 8$ ft.
65	tangutica	Species. Clear yellow bells in great profusion, growing on strong plants. The subsequent show of beautiful silky seed heads is truly spectacular.
66	texensis	Species. Flowers, usually pitcher shaped, in colours usually from pink to true red, which curl slightly back at the tips, often with a cream lip.
67	texensis hybrids	Hybrids. From extremely attractive plants with flowers in reds or pinks, which are often long tulip shaped. Herbaceous from 5 to 15 ft.
68	texensis special	Selection. Probably pollinated by a plant which has larger than usual pitcher shaped, superb red flowers, on a climber to about 6 ft.
69	tubulosa	Species. Upright, self supporting plants up to 6 ft. if happy in situation, with scented, hyacinth like flowers, from white through to purple. Unusual and lovely.
70	urticifolia	Species. A rare plant with deep blue/purple narrow bottle shaped recurving flowers on a strong herbaceous plant to 4 – 5 ft.
71	USA mixture	Hybrids. A wide ranging mixture, varying in shape, size, colour and height of growth. A tempting mixture, containing some real treasures.
72*	veitchiana	Species. A close cousin to <i>rehderiana</i> , but with slightly different leaves, which can have 20 or so leaflets. Rare and interesting.
73*	versicolor	Species. Lavender to red pitchers, fading to pale cream or green tips, growing on a herbaceous plant to 6 ft or so. Extremely attractive.
74	viorna mixture	A choice selection from these varicoloured pitcher shaped flowers on deciduous climbers to 8 ft. or so. Could be some real gems here.

75	vitalba	Species. Our only native clematis, the well loved 'Old Man's Beard', whose strength is it's superb seed heads. A very strong
		climber to 25 ft.
76	viticella	Species. Often dark purple, recurved bells on strong plants up to 15 ft. Very robust and trouble free European species.
77	viticella mixture	Hybrids. Open bells in a variety of shades and colours, including bi-colours, on strong, trouble free plants growing to around 15 ft.
78	viticella subsp. campaniflora	Species. Small white recurved bells, with a touch of blue/mauve, on strong plants up to 15 ft. A robust and generally trouble free Iberian subspecies.
79	viticella subsp. campaniflora 'Lisboa'	Hybrids. From an attractive plant which has small pendant, open, recurving bells in purple profusion. Growing to around 10 ft.

59a	sibirica var. tianschanica	A rare and new offering from the atragene group, with large, open bells in white, where the staminodes vary in form from the basic species.
74a	virginiana – wild collected	A North American version of our own 'Old man's beard', wild collected in Ontario. A vigorous climber with many small white starry flowers.
